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What was the goal of this survey?

The goal of this survey was to understand public opinion of current and future wolf policy and management among Bad River members as well as their tolerance for wolves, as decisions about wolves are being made.

Survey recipients and study area:

This 2009 Wolf Policy Survey was sent to 841 randomly selected Bad River members from a confidential database of Bad River Member households. It was random sample stratified by sex: half female and half male. The recipients addresses were all within Wisconsin and within known wolf range. 376 surveys were returned to us with responses. The response rate is $55\% \pm 6\%$.

Methods:


The initial survey packet included: (1) a copy of the questionnaire, (2) a \$2 incentive, (3) a cover letter explaining the survey and stating "This survey has been reviewed and commented on by the Bad River Natural Resources Department,"(4) a postage paid return envelope. Two weeks after the initial mailing a reminder postcard was sent out to initial non-responders. Another two weeks later, a second mailing of the questionnaire was sent out to non-responders. There was no \$2 incentive included in the second mailing. Two weeks after that, another reminder postcard was sent out to non-responders. While all the survey parts were written in English, on the cover letters both English and Ojibwe languages were used for the words Hello/Boozhoo, Wolf/Ma'iingan and Thank you/Miigwech.


Explanations of the graphs below:


The title of each graph is the question asked on the survey. The "n" is the number of respondents who answered the question. The "n" in each graph is different because not every respondent answered every question. Some questions were 'check only one'; others were 'check all that apply'. This means that not all the graphs will add up to the "n" since, for some questions, each respondent could check as many answers as they saw fit.


Demographics of the respondents:


How old are they?	They ranged from 18-91 years old
How long they have lived in Wisconsin?	They reported having lived in WI for 5-91 years
What sex are they?	45% female, 55% male
What is their level of education?	42% had completed some college
What is their income level?	66% reported their income is < \$40,000 per year
Are they Hunters?	46% reported having hunted in the past 2 years 65% reported having hunted regularly in the past
Is livestock a major source of income?	6% reported that livestock is a major source of income















































































About the following graphs:
